Frequently Asked Questions about Workers' Compensation in Delaware

Frequently Asked Questions

What is Workers' Compensation?

Workers' Compensation is a support system for employees injured or sick due to their job. It offers medical care, money while you can't work, and pays you for lasting injuries. If the worst happens and an employee dies because of their work related injury the family could receive benefits.

Who Gets Covered?

If you work in Delaware, your employer should have insurance to cover you, except for farm workers and some independent contractors. Special jobs like seamen and federal employees have their own federal laws.

What Benefits Can I Get?

Medical Benefits

You're covered for all needed doctor visits and hospital stays.

Temporary Total Disability

If you can't work for more than three days, you get paid starting the fourth day.

Temporary Partial Benefits

If you return to work but earn less, you get 2/3 of the difference between your old and new wage for up to 300 weeks.

Permanent Impairment Benefits

For lasting injuries, you could get paid based on how severe it is, please contact the Office of Workers' Compensation for more information.

Disfigurement Benefits

If you have scars or lose a limb because of work, you might get paid for up to 150 weeks.

Death Benefits

If a worker passes away, their dependents could get weekly payments and money for funeral costs.

How Do I Get These Benefits?

Tell your employer about your injury ASAP. You have 90 days to do this, or you might not get benefits. After that, your employer or their insurance should start paying out.

What If My Employer Won't Help?

You have two years from your injury to ask for help from the Office of Workers' Compensation. They can guide you, but you might want to get a lawyer since employers have them too.

Can I Be Fired for Claiming Benefits?

No. It's illegal for your employer to punish you for claiming benefits.
